Bury earned kudos by their sterling defence. Bradshaw kept goal finely, and made a lot of grand saves. He had a good sense of position, and many shots that were aimed at a point farthest away from him came safely into his arms because he moved to the right spot quickly.

Hart was a fine back, and Henderson filled the other position worthily, while Halton, playing for the first time at centre-half, did a lot of hard work, and moved very quickly, too. I should think this former forward would develop into a first-class pivot, for he has the physique, and he can play football with it. The flank halves worked hard, but were often beaten by the skilful manœuves of Redfern and Connelly.

Early in the game both Roberts and Kilshaw showed mettle, and took a lot of holding, but after they had scored a closer grip was kept on them, and gradually the Bury attack faded almost completely from the picture.

The Town made repeated assaults, but did not shoot well, though Stephenson made good efforts, but the inside forwards were prone to try and walk the ball right into the goal before they took a shot. The equalising goal by RED-FERN was the outcome of a sharp move by the inside forwards, with Finlayson doing the inlitatory work, and Bradshaw had no chance with the shot that was lobbed right away from him.

The second half was very nearly a continuous assault by the Town, and for long stretches the ball was not out of Bury's half, but the defence never-relaxed, and it began to look as though the Town would not get another. However, after very good work by Roberts and Stephenson, the former especially, Rediern, Vinall and Connelly, with Stephenson close up to them, had a severe tussie with the opposition inside the penalty area. The ball came out at the feet of CONNELLY, who quickly took position and then shot accurately, and Bradshaw had no chance.
