

TWO MORE FOR CARTER: LUTON AGAIN OUTPLAYED

TWO goals by Carter gave Derby County a 2—0 interval lead over Luton Town in the second "leg" of the third round F.A. Cup-tie at the Baseball Ground this afternoon. The Rams dominated the play, and but for their mistaken tactics in front of goal their score might have been larger.

LUTON TOWN were strengthened by the return of their captain, Gager, at centre-half.

They also made changes in the forward line and at right back.

With Ward no longer available Eggleston came in at left-half for the Rams.

Derby County played in black and white vertically striped shirts.

County, enjoying the advantage of the powerful wind, pressed from the start. Hesitancy by Doherty deprived him of the distinction of opening the score, but he made no bones about his next shooting chance, his powerful shot striking the upright and cross-bar angle. Carter also tried his luck, but Duke saved.

Morrison, put through shrewdly by Doherty, miskicked, but his shot, nevertheless, forced Duke to concede a corner. Morrison put past with the kick.

DOMINATING RAMS

Waugh was proving the trickiest of the visitors' forwards, and Needham with a solo dash caused Boulton some anxiety. It was, however, mainly a tale of Derby domination, and a corner by Crooks gave Morrison an opportunity to place his shot coolly. Duke, however, saved in spectacular style.

Close inter-passing, and mistaken down the middle tactics, marred some otherwise spectacular play by the Rams.

After Morrison and Carter had been pulled up for offside, Stamps, who had taken up position astutely on the right wing, tamely put the ball into Duke's hands with three unmarked colleagues hovering in the goalmouth.

CHANCE LOST

At the other end, Needham, after being put through on his own, delayed his shot, and Parr cutting across at top speed, cleared.

CARTER opened the scoring with a goal which was quite a scrambled affair. Duke failed to hold the ball, and Carter, although falling awkwardly, hooked it into the empty net.

Twice within the next three minutes, Dunamore kicked off the line with his goalkeeper beaten.

CARTER increased Derby County's lead after an interval of five minutes.

Credit for this success was due in the main, however, to Doherty, who with characteristic sauciness dribbled through the visitors' defence before slipping the model pass to Carter.

At the other end, Goodyear got the ball into the home net after clever play by Waugh—unquestionably Luton's most dangerous attacker—but the referee disregarded all claims for a goal on the score of offside.

PARR THERE AGAIN

Needham, for the second time, got clear of all opposition, but Parr, also for the second time, nipped across and blocked his shot.

Close on half-time Doherty, after chasing a powerful kick up field by Carter, passed to Morrison, whose rather feeble shot was headed over the bar for a profitless corner. Half-time—
