not crossed the line before Hughes kicked away. The referee thought otherwise and awarded a goal. Then came the final thunderbolt for Plymouth when BILLING-TON rounded off good work by Brennan and Ottewell with another well-taken goal.

There was no question of the Town's superiority, and they took their chances with great accuracy. Strongest part of the team was the half-back line in which Soo, leading the side, played brilliantly.
Gardiner was little, if anything, behind, while Hall made a great

debut and always proved a stumb-ling block to the home forwards. He was full of confidence, and played with the assurance of an experienced player. Hughes was the better back, and Streten was same in everything he

did. Star of the forward line was Brennan who was a continual source of danger. The quick way
