

CLUB CLIPPINGS

Now that the end of the season is drawing near, there will be one or two very good games being held within the next few weeks, both Representative and Club matches.

In April, England visit Hampden Park, the famous home of the Scottish team, to "do battle" with our friends from North of the Border. The English Selectors should have formed some idea of the team that will travel to Glasgow, after the Inter-League match at St. James' Park, Newcastle. Most of our supporters will be glad at the inclusion of two Derby County players in this game, and will join us in wishing them every success in future matches. Besides being a very great honour for the players themselves, it is also a great honour for the Club.

Fourteen days after the Hampden Park duel, the F.A. Cup Final will be held at Wembley, and judging from the records of Manchester United and Blackpool, it should be a game worth seeing. Apart from having a good record in the Cup Competition, the Clubs have an excellent record in the League, for both are quite near the top of the First Division Table. Blackpool have conceded only one goal in the Competition, but when they meet Manchester United it will be the first time they have played a First Division club, whereas Manchester United have met one in every round. This clearly illustrates the luck of the draw.

To-day we entertain Luton Town, and extend a hearty welcome to them. The Reserves will be engaged in a Central League match at Preston, and we hope that they will return home with two valuable points.

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OUR VISITORS.

In 1884 there were two Association Football Clubs in Luton, known as the Wanderers and the Excelsiors. In 1885 these two Clubs amalgamated and became known as the Luton Town Football Club. At first they played on the Excelsiors' Ground, and the Club colours were navy blue and pink halved shirts. Also the same colouring was used for the caps, which were a compulsory part of the equipment. But in 1889 the colours were changed to cochineal, and the Club was then known in the South as the Reds.

In December, 1891, Luton offered 5/- a week to the players F. and H. Whitby, and Read. H. Whitby accepted these terms and was paid this amount for the remainder of the season. But in February, 1891, F. Whitby made an application for a further sum to cover expenses of travelling and for the loss of time from work, but this was refused. So, although Arsenal are credited as being the first Southern Club to pay its players, it will be seen in actual fact that it was Luton.

In May, 1894, they joined the Southern League on its formation, but after two seasons in this League they withdrew, and made an application to join the Second Division of the Football League, this being refused. So they joined a new League, the United League. But only nine clubs took part, and there weren't enough matches, and the season finished in a loss.

Owing to an enforced change of grounds during the season, Luton had to open a new enclosure at Dunstable Road. In June, 1897, a Limited Liability Company was formed. At the same time the Club was admitted to the English League, and they made quite a good start in their first season. But they had another setback in 1904 when they had to find another ground, this time at Kenilworth Road. Since then the Club has had mixed fortunes.

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
