The Town met a sharp-shooter at Elland-road on Saturday, and in a scrappy game, in which both teams missed chances, CHISHOLM, the Scottish International inside-left, stood out as the man who could find the way to the net.

Twice in six minutes early in the second half, he cracked the ball past Streten, and these two shots meant the end of the Town's hopes of repeating their last season's double over the United.

Which meant that Leeds, without the potentialities of Cardiff City, earned two much-needed points, and, as things turned out, might have had even a bigger win, for both Chisholm and Wakefield saw scoring efforts strike the woodwork.

hard without much support and the left wing was more effective than the right.

Cooke and Lindsay came through a worrying time creditably, and Streten, while taking some risks. managed to effect some spectacu-

lar clearances.

Giving a very in and out showing, the Town rarely settled down to ordered, accurate football, but the chances came their way, and Waugh and Nelson should have scored before half-time.

A goal at that stage would have put the Town on top, but it eluded them, and continued to do so until the end of the game, though the remainder of the forwards had opportunities in the second half, but could not turn them to account
