Everyone was quite prepared for Kiernan needing this game to settle down, for he had been a Luton player only a matter of hours, but he fitted in as if he had been playing with his new colleagues for weeks.

Right from the start he showed brilliant footwork, and

what struck me more than any-thing else was the clever way in which he switched the point of the attack time and again.

Watkins had an excellent game, too, and had his goal saved a point for the Town, it would have been a great reward for him. Certainly, he will remember his first League goal for the Town, for the ball shot into the net like a rocket to equalise the one obtained by WILLIAMS, following a corner, when the game was half

an hour old.

WATKINS'S equaliser came with only 15 minutes remaining for play, and a division of the spoils seemed to be in the offing, especially as the Town defence was displaying all the indomitable qualities which have been apparent
