NOTES.

Our very hearty congratulations go today to the team on the great achievement of taking the club, for the second time in its history, into the semi-final for the F.A. Cup.

It is an accomplishment on which Leicester City feels justifiably very proud, a triumph of unsurpassed team spirit, despite having been drawn away from home in three out of four rounds and on two occasions having to face the acid test of arrears in extra time.

There was, however, no such close shave at Brentford a week ago. Our success was the most decisive of the sixth round and there was unanimity on its merit.

London's last hope went out fighting to the last ditch but once Mal. Griffiths had added to the tonic goal which Jack Lee gave the side earlier on, there was never much doubt of the result.

The goal-scoring consistency of these two forwards has been a very important factor in the Cup progress, but they would be the last to desire more credit than the others. Every player called upon has played his part and to them one and all we say "Well done."

Here we take opportunity of expressing the sincere sympathy of the club, its players and supporters to Charlie Adam, on his sad bereavement, and to thank him for valuable services under trying circumstances. His desire to carry on with his job was a fine example of club loyalty.

We are indeed in very exalted company in the semi-final. Portsmouth (present League I. leaders), Manchester United (Cup-holders) and the Wolves—all former winners of the coveted trophy—form a formidable array.

There will, quite rightly, be a healthy respect by our team when they face Portsmouth in the semi-final at Highbury on March 26th, but no stage fright.

The run of Cup and League matches without defeat, brought up to eleven at Brentford, has given the team confidence to challenge the best. We look forward to a contest at Highbury that will prove worthy of the important occasion and also, in every way, in keeping with the traditions of both clubs.

It is a coincidence nothing short of remarkable that Leicester and Portsmouth should be due to meet again in the semi-final. And, of course, we hope to go one better than in 1934.

After three successive weeks of cup football, we are back to League rivalry again afternoon. Luton Town need no introduction to our supporters.

The two thrilling cup matches, full of goals, good football and excellent sportsmanship they provided in opposition to us, have left an indelible mark that will remain for a very long time.

If we get the same fare today, we are in for a treat, irrespective of the result, although this obviously is very important to our club.
