Burtenshaw, Taylor all opened their scoring in League football. accounts BURTENSHAW'S goal came in four minutes, which gave the Town a fine start to their task of

breaking their unlucky run.
Then, with only 10 minutes
gone, MULVANEY marked his first appearance at centre-forward in the League side by bundling the ball over the line after Jepson had half-stopped a hot shot from Waugh.

Although the Town continued to have more of the play up to the interval, the City staved off further disaster until six minutes after the resumption, BRENNAN headed past Jepson following a splendid bit of work

by Burtenshaw. This goal meant the end of any slight Lincoln hopes of saving the game, and although their inside forwards played some clever football at times, they seldom looked like breaking down the

sound Town defence.

Newcomers to the forward line, Taylor and Mulvaney, both justified their inclusion, and the former, a highly promising young player, looks a real proposition for the future.

Mulvaney revealed ability in the way he sought to keep his line together, and he gave certain proof that if the chances are there he will not be slow to take them. Naturally, some of his work was on unorthodox lines, but, on this showing, the Town must persevere with him in this

Both Burtenshaw and Waugh were generally too fast and eleverfor a rather lumbering defence, to which they provided a constant problem and threat.

Brennan looked far happier at inside-left, and was responsible for many clever moves. He was perhaps inclined to play too much to his wingman, but the bulk of his work was most accomplished, and he showed excellent control of the lively ball. the lively ball.

There was no weak spot in a defence which was not really thoroughly tested, but sufficient was seen of Owen to give the firm impression that he will settle down into a first-class centre-half. centre-half. He was flanked by two reso-lute, extremely successful wing halves in Watkins and Gardiner, and both Wilson and Cooke

and both Wilson and Cooke played excellently.
Duke's opportunities to show his worth were strictly limited, for the City forwards were poor in finishing, but he dealt with everything that came his way in capable, assured fashion.
