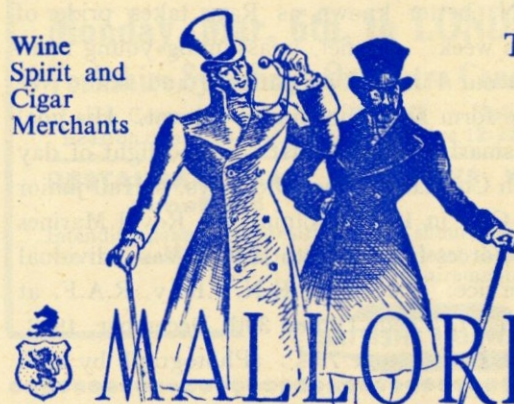

We all hope he will maintain the form he is showing at present. His goal against Cardiff was a real "smasher." Ray first saw the light of day in Hull. He first played with Constable Street Old Boys, a Hull junior team. Signed for Leicester City in 1942. Joining the Royal Marines he served in the Middle East Forces from 1942 to 1946. Was individual parachutist in Special Air Service. Played for R.N.V.R. v. R.A.F. at Aston Villa, 1946. Transferred to Leeds United 30th December, 1948. The way our boys were going at the finish on a mud heap in driving wind and rain, speaks volumes for their wonderful fitness, and Cardiff had had enough. Well done, boys! You had made history and, for the first time in 30 years, we had entered the 6th round of the Cup. Fourteen years ago we were beaten by Sheffield United in round 5 at Sheffield.
