To gain territorial advantage without goals is of no earthly use, which is a fact the Town have discovered the hard way this season and they were given an object lesson in the way to accept chances by North End.

First goal came after 17 minutes when HORTON stabbed the ball into the corner of the net furthest away from Hughes, and the second, seven minutes after the interval, when WAY-MAN smacked the ball into the net from a low cross by Anders.

Both these were first-time

defence no time whatever to tackle—in marked contrast to some of the finishing attempts by the Town forwards.

The very act of getting the ball under control and then seeking the opening gives the opposing defence time to cover up, and quite a number of shots from the Town forwards cannoned off defenders.

was a snap affair by GLOVER, who drove the ball from near the edge of the penalty area and it sailed into the net after being deflected a little by a defender.

Not that the goal did the

Town's cause a lot of good, for the ball only just beat the final whistle on its way to the net, and there was some doubt in spectators' minds as the players left the field about whether the goal had counted, for there was no time to restart play.

Some of the Town's midfield play was clever, but, too often, it led nowhere and a great deal more snap is required in the finishing. As often happens though when a team is struggling they are not having the slightest
