That the lead was maintained until 15 minutes from the interval was largely due to the brilliance of Streten whose displays recently must be putting him back as a contender for International honours again.


Defence Troubled By First-Time Play

WHAT was just as important was that the Rovers moved balt forward and made ground without waste of time.

By comparison, the Town played too much "sideways" football, and it took them far too long to make ground against a determined hard-tackling goodcovering defence.

Few attempts were made to open out the play and there were too many cases of players running with the ball when a well-judged pass would have saved energy and trouble and been far more effective.

Town Defence Was Very Rattled

ROVERS' tactics were particularly suited to a Cup-tie. whereas the Town tried to play their normal game and found that they were simply not allowed to by a team which came in to meet the ball every time. Surprising thing was that the

defence became rattled early on and never really recovered to show the usual solid front. Rovers had them chasing all

over the place with Owen having the unenviable task of trying to plug up holes that appeared. The centre half had a harass-

ing and not entirely successful time as a result and he was even beaten in the air at times.

Big Factors In Rovers' Attack

THE craft of Petherbridge on whom Aherne never obtained grip and the dash and enthusiasm of Roost were big factors in the Rovers' attack apart from the smart leadership of Lambden. Petherbridge beat Aherne with

much regularity and surprising ease and this was one hole that was never effectively plugged.

On the other flank. Cooke did not tackle with his customary accuracy and force and his kicking was not of the best either. while in front of him. Morton failed to keep tabs on Roost, who was liable to pop up almost anywhere.

Morton was never on top of things, and was able to make little contribution to the men in front of him.

Only Streten Added To His Reputation

MORE successful was Watkins, who could have varied his use of the short ball more often and with better effect, but taking the match through, the defence had a most unsettled afternoon. Only one who really added to

his reputation was Streten, to whom the Town owed a debt that they were in such a good position. so far as the score was concerned for so long.

Undoubtedly, the forwards suffered from lack of material. but they did not move as a line and, by keeping the ball too close, invariably ran into trouble.

Stobbart The Best Of The Forwards

PUCK of the attack was Stobbart who worked tremendously hard and produced some brilliant bits of footwork. It all failed to add up to goals though and Stobbart himself received few chances against the strong Warren.

Most of the Town's scoring chances came from Glover's centres, delayed though they were at times, but whenever the outside right received the ball there was always the promise of some development which could hardly be said of Wyldes.

Argument has been mounting since the defeat of the wisdom of replacing Havenga by Wyldes and the latter certainly had an unhappy match.

Bamford's Mastery Over Wyldes

▲ GOOD deal of credit should go to Bamford, who cut out the winger repeatedly and so close was his marking that Wyldes simply could not find a way of beating him. Longer passes to him into the

open space might have helped. but Wyldes finished badly on the occasions when he did get clear of the full-back's attentions and this move went wrong. Davie stood out as a craftsman

in his control of the ball and ability to outwit an opponent, but there were times when he attempted too much when a quick, crisp pass was the need.

Shanks did much chasing without achieving a great deal of real value, and with a weakness on each flank, the line was badly balanced.
