Praise, But No Points For Gallant Town

PRESTON NORTH END 1 LUTON TOWN

If ever the Town needed a full-strength side and no accidents to happen, it was at Deepdale on Saturday when they faced up to a Preston team perched on top of the Second Division.

However, that imp of fate who, one way or another, has paid more than average attention to the Town this season, interfered again and they found themselves facing the second half a goal down and with virtually only 10 men.

A collision with Streten when both were trying to make certain that the ball did not reach Finney caused Aherne to be a concussion victim and although his first-half absence amounted to only two minutes, he could not resume for the start of the second half.

For 17 minutes, the Town struggled on without him and even when he returned he went to the highly unfamiliar position for him of outside-right.

As so often happens, a mis-fortune of this kind inspired the others and they gave a highly courageous, non-stop fighting display against the goal-hungry Preston forwards who were unable to increase the single goal lead they gained after 20 minutes.

Their scorer was HORTON. who made ground quickly to hit into the net from close in, a cross pass from Wayman, who had veered out to the left.

In a way, Preston were fortunate that this goal was not merely an equaliser, for they were most fortunate to escape earlier when Stobbart broke clean through the defence, but placed the ball wide of the post as Gooch advanced.

Both played their parts manfully, and although there were close calls when Finney twice hit the woodwork and then headed inches wide, and other chances were missed, the Town held out, and thoroughly deserved to do so. Late in the game there was a spirited rally by them during

True, the Town went down, but they did so with the flag flying high and their fighting spirit unimpaired. Never did they let up, and every man played his part.

Main honours in defence were shared by Owen for the way in which he kept Wayman in subjection, and Streten for his brilliant anticipation and consistently good judgment.

There were full marks for the others, though, with Aherne, until his injury, making quite a good job of holding Finney, and
