GRIMSBY TOWN The Town's capacity for rising to the occasion, which has been evident in previous meetings with relegation rivals, was seen again at Blundell Park on Saturday when they beat a poor Grimsby team in comfortable style.

Those two precious points were gained without the Town striking the best form of which they are capable, but, for all that, they were never in real danger of defeat.

In a scrappy sort of game, very nearly all the good football came from the Town, who had the more constructive ideas, were quicker on the ball, and were much more impressive in their

finishing.

Much over-anxiety could be perceived in the play of both teams in the first half during which Grimsby had more of the play, without ever appearing likely turn their advantage to account.
