

The first was of the style we seldom see these days from a terrific shot from between 25 and 30 yards range that simply sent the ball screaming into the back of the net.

Appealed Against The First Goal

THIS spectacular effort counted | Brentford v. Birmingham as the first equaliser to a goal scored by Dryburgh after 13 minutes.

Incidentally, the Town players were flabbergasted when this was allowed for they alleged that Rowley had handled the ball in a tussle with Cooke and this left the opening for the outside-left.

Davie Worried The City Defence
