Forwards' 12 Goals In Four Matches

In each of the last three matches, they have scored three goals and Jack Taylor has struck the scoring trail again to the extent of five goals in the last three games.

Taylor Worried Bees' Defence Again

ONCE again, he was the man who worried the Brentford defence most, and he set the Town off on the right foot with a splendidly headed goal from Davies's centre five minutes after the start.

Someone sitting near me muttered, "The same old story," a reference, no doubt, to the early reverse met by Brentford at Highbury and from the same player.

Coincidence went even further when Billy Dare obtained the equaliser at exactly the same stage of the game as he had in the second re-play.

Two Goals Came From Corners

IT was in the 32nd minute that he leapt into the air as if he had springs in his heels to head the ball into the corner of the net from Ledgerton's corner kick.

This question of marking from corners is something to which some attention will be given this week, no doubt, and another, corner from the right this time, provided Dare with his second goal, three minutes from half-time.

This was a case of a badly placed kick reaping unexpected results, for the ball was pulled back low and quite far back.

Lively Ball Eluded Everybody

DARE had a swing at it and the ball threaded its way through a crowd of players in quite remarkable fashion.

At least three tried to make contact with the bouncing ball, but it eluded everybody, including Cooke, stationed near the post.

Cooke was probably put off by the fact that Sperrin, just in front of him, made a "swish" at it but missed.

To be a goal down at the interval after the promising start and early sparkle was a disappointment to the Town, but they quickly got back on level terms when the second half started.

Moore's Pass Gave Taylor His Chance

ONE of those quickly developed movements that gets the best of defences into trouble brought the goal.

Moore gained control of the ball outside the penalty area and, looking around, saw an open space with Taylor waiting to run into it.

Without waste of time, Moore flicked the ball down the middle and Taylor was on to it in a trice and slammed the ball into the roof of the net before Gaskell's advance could get him near enough to gain possession.

Faced An Uphill Battle Again

THE goal that put Brentford into the lead again came, not from a corner this time, but from a low centre by Ledgerton and Horn from near point-blank range, hit the ball into the net as he fell.

Twenty minutes of the second half had gone then and the Town were faced again with the prospect of an uphill battle.

Not that they let that worry them, for they continued to play confident, constructive football and it was no more than their reward when Davies levelled matters again 13 minutes from the end.

Last Goal Came From Defensive Blunder

ABOUT this goal, there was a distinct similarity to the Town's first at Highbury, for, once again, it was a bad defensive blunder that brought it.

Greenwood and Gaskell went for the ball together and, with Moore close up, they neither obtained possession.

I noticed that the referee gave a quick glance at the linesman because Moore looked to be in an offside position, but he definitely was not interfering with the play.

Taylor Caught Everybody's Eye

DURING the closing stages, the Brentford goal had two or three narrow escapes, particularly from Taylor and Davies, and a couple of chances went astray, too, during this period.

Player who caught everybody's eye again was Taylor, cleverest and most trustful inside forward on the field.

At the moment he is in tremendous form, and not only is he getting the goals, but he is beginning movements and laying on chances, too.

Davies Was In Bright Form

WITH Davies, he formed the best-balanced wing partnership on view, and the outside-right was a dangerous raider.

His speed worried Munro, and he crossed the ball consistently.

Moore's style of play has changed a great deal since he first arrived at Kenilworth-road, and he is holding the line together and distributing the ball well.

Owen Came Through Formidable Test

THE left wing was in quieter vein than the right, though Stobbs did much that was useful in midfield.

He was not so forceful as he was at Highbury, and Mitchell again suffered from the fact that little is going right for him in his finishing.

Perhaps the most pleasing thing to Town fans was that Owen came through this quite formidable test without mishap.

In the early stages he was a little uncertain, but he quickly gained full confidence and tackled hard and in such a manner as to suggest that his ankle trouble has cleared up.

Wing Halves Strong In The Tackle

ONCE again the wing halves, Morton and Watkins, played a big part in the success. Strong and effective in the tackle, they were difficult to beat and there was some good distribution from both.

Apart from two or three isolated occasions, Coote could not make much of Aherne, who turned in another excellent display, but Coote has not regained his touch completely yet and was again troubled by Ledgerton.

Two saves by Stretton from Hill brought down the house, and the goalkeeper came through very well.

Reserves Failed To Rise To Occasion

PLAYING before a big crowd Luton Town Reserves failed to rise to the occasion.

They gave a colourless display against Watford Reserves, but as Watford were little better, they can consider themselves distinctly fortunate to have collected two points.

Defences were on top in the first half, and Luton had rather more of the play without looking particularly dangerous in front of goal.

Turner was the most consistent forward, and he had several good attempts saved by Underwood.

Penalty Claims Were Turned Down

IN the second half Luton were unlucky to have two strong appeals for penalties turned down.

Both Sexton and Shanks were brought down in the penalty area when they looked likely scorers. Just after Sexton was grounded Wilson broke away and scored for Watford, and a few minutes later he obtained a second.

Baynham had no chance with the shots that beat him. Turner was the best of a not-very-brilliant forward line, and Miller and Scott, the two newcomers from Spennymoor United, gave only fair performances on their first appearance at Luton.
