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
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# Town Sign A Goalkeeper

In the face of competition from two First Division clubs, the Town have secured the signature on amateur forms of Philip Roy Clare, 17-years-old goalkeeper of South Midlands League team, Bletchley Town.

Clare, who stands 6ft., is likely to be given an early chance in the "A" team.

## Many Did Not Know Why It Was Awarded

THE penalty awarded to the Town five minutes before the interval against Kiernan was a much less obvious affair, except to people behind the Kenilworthroad goal.
