PYE TOOK FULL TOLL

So much superior were the Town in the second half that they might well have given their goal average an even more decided boost.

There was a shot from Mitchell that struck a post to be followed shortly afterwards by a second goal from PYE obtained 12 minutes after the restart

He was left with the sort of chance he does not miss when he secured the ball from a rebound about 10 yards from goal and that was the beginning of the end for Southampton.

There were few occasions when a rather muddling home attack suggested that they would be able to stage a rally and a far more likely happening seemed to be that the Town would increase their lead quite substantially.

Playing good, open football, the forwards worried Saints' defence, but some chances were missed, apart from which there were one or two close calls.

The Town forwards played well as a whole and they functioned as a line in most promising fashion.

TOWN MORE DANGEROUS

Throughout, the Town were by far the more dangerous in attack, and there was no hesitation about having a crack at goal.

Once the defence had settled down and got over the initial shock of the early reverse, they took a grip on the Saints' attack which was not relaxed for the remainder of the game.

Morton soon put the shackles on newcomer Walker, who did not live up to his bright beginning, and Shanks, after being a little worried by Dudley in the first half, took his measure afterwards. Both wing-halves were much on top after the interval.

Judd will remember this as one of his least successful games because of the mastery Owen attained over him, and Aherne kept Day unusually quiet, too.

For Dunne, there was an uneasy sort of start against McDonald, but through playing closer to the winger in the second half, Dunne came right into his own.

Such was the marksmanship of the Saints' forwards that Streten did not have an unduly difficult afternoon, but what there was to do he accomplished in a stylish, confident fashion.
