Kerfoot and Dunn at right half and right-back for United, played them-selves almost to a standatil following defence with rallant offence. but the best defender on view was Owen, the home centre half, who held Charles in a vice-like grip and conatructed from every clearance. Luton made the better start and

had threatened to score before McCabe did so for them in the seventh minute. Moore had brilliantly uncovered Davis and the latter crossed a low centre from which Pye might have scored had not McCabe sent it into goal. Luton fully deserved their half-time lead, but United rallied and twice Nightingale nearly scored A minute from the end, however, Luton turned from anxious goal area defence to attack, and Mitchell swept in from the wing to slam a shot against the far post. Pye, alertly following-up, scored off the rebound.
