Scott dazzling in first half FOREST GET DOUBLE OVER LUTON Derby seize

Nottingham Forest ... 2 Luton Town 1 COREST completed an early season double over the once-fancied promotion candidates Luton Town, and earned the spoils from the second leg at the City Ground on their firsthalf display alone.

In that period they deserved their two goals success, and, mainly by reason of some bewildering switching along the whole front line, had the Luton defence chasing a will-o'-the-wisp.

Neither side could be faulted in defence except that Jones was uncertain on the visitors' left, the two fair-haired pivots generally holding the middle but while all four wing-halves were thrustful. Luton's pair moved the ball smartly, whereas French and particularly Burkitt occasionally overdid the close dribbling.

Stream of passes

Main reason for the monopoly of play held by the home side in the opening spell was the craft and hall manoeuvre of Scott, who re-turned to inside right to ply a constant, stream of threatening

passes.

He played further back in the second half and with Capel not coming into the picture until late on when a sizzling drive scraped an upright and another effort was plucked from under the bar by Streten, the hard-working Lever-ton was invariably a lone figure, with the two wingers coming in on

some occasions in support.

But Luton had only one man to try a shot, inside right Turner, who, justifiably, scored their goal who, justinably, scored their goal when acting as attack leader in a post-interval rearrangement of the forward line.

All Luton's progress was on the wings, but it was wasted effort, for once the ball was crossed the incides rarely made purposity nearest.

than the 18-yard line. While Walker made one or two very fine saves, his task was by no means as onerous as that of Streten, who had full scope for his desire to exhibit acrobatics.

Forest's overwhelming first half was football at its best, all five forwards buzzing around the goal with a sting. Luton tought better in the drabber second patch, the winners making a come-back late

The attempt went awry and Moore was given a clear run for goal. Cutting in the winger went right up to the advancing Streten, beat the goalkeeper's last-minute tackle, took the ball on a couple of strides and shot inside the near post of a now untenanted goal.

From then on it was all Forest, Walker handling for the first time after 18 minutes.

A great shot by Leverton after Collindridge's persistence took the paint off the top, a volley from Capel was pulled down by Streten and Burkitt with Collindridge provided neat interpassing.

Once again Leverton was only inches high after a Capel-Scott move. Turner foozled the visitors' only opportunity of the half and in 41 minutes Leverton rounded off a brilliant move with a drive from near the penalty spot.

Scott swept the ball out to Moore, whose accurate centre reached Scott again. The latter pushed it back and Streten never

saw Leverton's shot.

With that lead Forest seemed content and forsook the former penetrative methods until in 77 minutes Turner enlivened the game with his goal
