Coming Event Did Not Cast Shadow

Then Swansea Were Thrown Right Back

NO blame could be saddled on Owen for this happening. but, for once, the covering of the Town defence that has been such a factor recently, did not function.

Despite this shock start Swansea were thrown right back on to the defensive by some clever work by the Town forwards, ably backed up by the wing halves, and the equaliser might have come very quickly.

On the other hand, Swansea, relying to a marked extent on their speed might conceivably have added to their lead had their spotting been at all accurate and Jones (C).

Equaliser Came From Moore

AT no stage did Swansea look really comfortable, and while the equaliser never looked far away, it took an uncommonly long time to arrive.

When it did the referee was already looking at his watch preparatory to signalling halfvime.

Fine Approach Work, But Little Finish

Turner's Bad Luck With His Shooting

TROUBLE was that the elaboration was carried a little too far on occasions and far too many attacks broke down when the penalty area was reached without a shot being produced.

Were Satisfactory Up To A Point

MITCHELL had the measure of the full-back, but the best opening he made for himself brought free kicks from which nothing developed.
