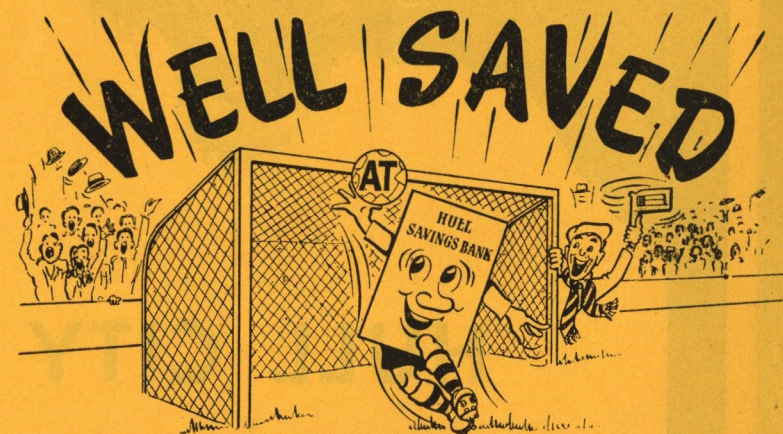

MANAGER'S NOTES.

Good afternoon,

Not knowing the result of the replayed Cup-tie on Wednesday, as these notes were written previously, I hope that the boys have retained their interest in the Cup by winning the replay. What a game it was last Saturday, everything that makes for an exciting match was included. From our point of view the match began tragically when Ken. Harrison, involved in so simple an incident, should receive such a serious accident as a broken knee cap. When I saw him go down and not rise quickly, knowing Ken., I knew he had got a bad one but little realised he had received such a serious accident. This was indeed a hard blow after only three minutes, but did you ever see ten lads fight as our boys fought afterwards? I thought they were wonderful and they only got their desserts when we equalised from a dramatic penalty in the last minute. All these lads played themselves into the ground, trying to make up for that man short and even when we got a goal down they still refused to be beaten. And then came that last despairing rush by Jensen which resulted in our being granted a penalty. You could feel the hush whilst the ball was placed, with the Spurs players gesticulating and then Viggo hit it and "hey presto" we lived to fight another day. What enthusiasm and excitement and what a climax to a great struggle by ten men to keep the fortunes of the Club still interested in the Cup. After the game I went along to see Ken. in the Royal Infirmary and there he was as perky as ever. I should like to say thank you to Mr. Fellowes and the Rediffusion engineers, who, without having any tea, went along to play over the record of the game for him. He was as pleased as punch. Thank you gentlemen!

I should also like to thank the anonymous gentleman from the fish dock who sent along those grand cartoons, the players really enjoyed them.

The Reserve team had no game on Saturday.

The "A" Team played Malet Lambert in the E.R.C.F.A. Senior Cup and after a thrilling struggle, which needed extra time, they won 5-3, Atkinson (3), Head and Colton scoring.

The Intermediate team lost 2-1, at Chesterfield, Blenkarn getting their goal.

The other teams had blank days on account of the Cup-tie at the Park.

CLUB MATTERS.

What a wonderful tonic to the football season the F.A. Cup gives. For our Fifth Round tie with the Spurs on Saturday we had a capacity crowd, 46,839, who paid £7,203. 18. 6, which is just short of the record amount taken in the well-remembered Sixth Round tie with Manchester United a year or two back.

On going the rounds one frequently hears the comment "City are well in the money now", but little do those outside the Club realise just how much Clubs do get from these big gates, so I intend to devote a little space this week to show the position.

The gross gate was, as I have previously stated, £7,203. 18 6, and from this must be deducted Entertainment Tax, £1,717. 6. 6, Match expenses—Printing, Posting and Advertising, Police, Gatemen, Referee and Linesmen's expenses, Visiting Team's Hotel and Travelling expenses amounting to £453. 12. 6, leaving a balance for division of £5,032. 19. 6—City, Tottenham and the F.A. receiving £1,677. 13. 2 each. On top of this each Club must pay 4% of their share of the gate to the Football League, and this takes a further £67. 2. 1, so City's net receipts were in fact £1610. 11. 1, and in the event of the gate in the re-arranged League match with Bristol Rovers not reaching the average for the season they will have to pay compensation to Bristol Rovers.

This applies to all Clubs, so you will readily appreciate that they do not benefit financially to any great extent in the long run. The big snag of course is Entertainment Tax, and it is to be hoped that the Chancellor of the Exchequer will do something about it in the forthcoming Budget. He will certainly have to give the matter most careful consideration, otherwise, as the Chairman stated at the Club's Annual Meeting, one can see some of the old established Clubs ceasing to function in the future, for with falling gates some of them are having extreme difficulty to carry on.

Ken. Harrison. I am pleased to report that Ken. has undergone his operation and is making good progress. We all wish him a speedy recovery.

Viggo Jensen. A very pleasing ceremony took place in the Board Room prior to Monday's Board Meeting when this popular player was presented with a Benefit cheque of £750 by the Chairman. Well done Viggo, may we have the pleasure of watching you play for years to come, is what I hear our Supporters saying, and what's more, they mean it.

Amateur Cup. As many of you will have noticed in the Press, the F.A. have arranged that in the event of a replay being necessary in the Amateur Cup Semi-final tie, Crook Town v. Finchley or Walthamstow Avenue, it will be played at Boothferry Park on March 20th next. It will mean the postponement of one of our Reserve team matches, but we shall be happy to stage such an important match if needs be.

Today's visitors. We extend a very warm welcome to our friends, Luton Town, who since they joined the Second Division have turned out many fine players. They play attractive football and have usually held a reasonably good position in the League Table, as they do now. They have a special distinction, that of being able to produce goalkeepers of International class, and not many seasons back they had in fact two such players on their

PEN PICTURES OF LUTON TOWN PLAYERS.

B. STRETEN—(Goalkeeper). Was serving in the R.A.F. when he joined Luton as an amateur in January, 1947. Was demobbed exactly a year later and signed professional forms. Six Amateur and one full International Cap to his credit.

S. DUNNE—(Right-back). Born Wicklow, Eire. Secured from Shelbourne in May, 1950. Has already been awarded two Eire Caps this season, bringing his total to four.

L. JONES—(Right-back) A young Welshman. Played for local Schoolboy and Junior sides before signing amateur forms for Luton. Within one month had signed professional and has very quickly made the grade.

T. AHERNE—(Left-back). Signed from Belfast Celtic in March, 1949. Played for his country, Eire, in every International in the past three seasons and has already played versus Luxemburg this season.

R. MORTON—(Right-half). Local boy who signed professional in February, 1946. Was freely tipped for International honours last season through his brilliant displays at right-half.

S. OWEN—(Centre-half). Secured from Birmingham City in 1947. Toured Australia with the F.A. two years ago and was a member of the Football League team which played in Copenhagen in May last year.

C. WATKINS—(Left-half). Came to Luton from Glasgow Rangers in 1948. Played with success at inside-forward for a large part of last season but is now back to his best position at half-back.

W. SHANKS—(Wing-half or Forward). Was born in Valetta, Malta. Since joining Luton, after a month's trial, in January, 1947, has played in a great variety of positions. Is a full ninety minutes player.

M. CULLEN—(Outside-right). Joined Luton from a Scottish Junior Club on the recommendation of an ex-Luton player. Is making his first appearance in League side today since receiving shoulder injury against Birmingham City last September.

G. TURNER—(Inside-right). A Doncaster boy who was recommended to Luton whilst playing in Navy football. The son of former Hull City player. Selected to play for F.A. XI versus Cambridge University last season, scoring three goals.

J. SCOTT—(Centre-forward). Demobbed from the R.A.F. late last season. The Club consider they did a very good stroke of business when he was signed from Spennymoor United three seasons ago.

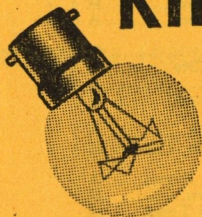

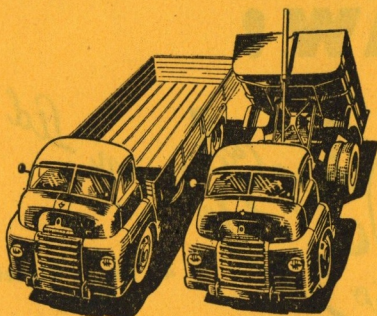
