Was Reliance On Defence Inevitable?

For their capacity to fight back when apparently faced with a hopeless cause, the County deserve every credit, but whether or not the Town were faced with any other option but to rely on packed defence to hold their slender lead in the closing minutes, is a moot point.

Might Have Been In Unassailable Position
