

Attractive Guests

The continued interest of Luton Town in the "promotion 'has been a feature of post-war Second Division stakes soccer, and in welcoming them again today we naturally expect to see some attractive play from what are "local derby rivals." The comparatively short distance between our respective headquarters always ensures the presence of a large number of supporters from the visiting club—be it at Upton Park or Kenilworth Road—and today is not likely to prove an exception. Whether or not this contingent will be reinforced by the presence of manager Dally Duncan is another matter, for Dally has spent most of his Saturday afternoons of late "scouting" in various parts with the obvious objective of strengthening his club's ability to maintain their challenge; among other places that he has recently visited is Upton Park, but whether he came to watch Cardiff City Reserves or our own second-string that day is something which we don't expect him to disclose! However, it does appear that in his temporary absence some of his problems have been solved, and the success of centre-forward Morton since he was moved from a defensive position has been a big factor in gaining Luton the following record:

Home ... played 9, won 8, drawn 0, lost 1, goals 21 - 9
Away ... played 8, won 2, drawn 1, lost 5, goals 12 - 17

In the immediate post-war seasons Luton Town had the reputation of being a "bogy team" for the Hammers at Upton Park, but this has to a great extent been dispelled by our last four meetings here. True enough the visitors took both points from us on one of these occasions, but on the other three days we gained good victories to earn the points.

Last season's fixtures took place during the Christmas holidays; a solitary goal sufficed to keep the points at Upton Park on the Christmas Day morning, but on Boxing Day afternoon a 3—1 victory found Luton securing their revenge.

Away Points

An unchanged team gained our third away victory of the season at the Portman Road Ground last Saturday, the 3—0 success being our biggest away margin since we beat Brentford by 4—1 at Griffin Park in March, 1953.

The win was gained at the expense of a side which is struggling to avoid returning to the Third Division after but one season in the higher sphere, but the success lost none of its value because of that factor. One report actually said that we were the better of two poor sides—would it be that we could play as "poorly" as that on every occasion, for three clear goals is not a bad margin for a "poor side"! But seriously, we do consider that such a report did not do justice to our XI's performance, and can only hope that the commentator was having an "off day" such as sometimes befalls many of the teams he watches!

The indisputable facts about the game were the three goals, all of which were fine efforts. The first tally four minutes after the start certainly shook the opposition, Andrews hitting the ball home from ten yards' range with a left-foot volley following Hooper's cross-pass over the entire Ipswich defence; the second came from Andrews' corner after constant pressure by our forwards, Dick "climbing" to meet the ball in the 55th minute with a header that left the 'keeper helpless; and the third was the culmination of a glorious 70-yard run by Hooper, who beat several men in his dash down field before squaring the ball from the bye-line for Sexton to run it into the net.

Meanwhile our defence was playing coolly, keeping the homesters well subdued and blotting out the threat of Garneys (whose dozen goals this season stamp him as the Town's main attacking threat) and altogether it could be summed up as a display of all-round solidarity that showed team-work to full advantage.

The 18,650 attendance was only a couple of thousand below Ipswich's best for the season, but it was pleasing to see that at least 1,000 of them were Hammers' followers. This did much to encourage our lads and, on their behalf, we sincerely thank all those who made the journey.

In conclusion, we do congratulate the Ipswich supporters on their keenness, for the game does have a big hold in the locality, local pride being strong for their team. Likewise, the playing-surface was of a quality that Wembley might well envy, and the claim that it is one of the best in the country is indeed well founded.

Essex Professional Cup

We played our Semi-Final tie in the Essex Professional Cup on November 11th against Colchester United on the Layer Road Ground. The homesters fielded half-a-dozen of their First XI regulars against this Hammers' line-up: Gregory; Wright, Cantwell; Bing, Nelson (A), Noakes; Wragg, Barrett, Dixon, Parker, Tucker.

Rather against the run of the play Colchester were the first to score, but Dixon restored us to equality with a good goal before half-time. Gaining the upper hand in the second half we forged ahead when Parker went through on his own to net after a fine run, but shortly before the 90 minutes were up a defensive error allowed our opponents to make it 2—2. This necessitated 10 minutes each way extra time, but in this final spell the Hammers proved to have the better stamina and, following a pass from Wragg, Dixon made it 3—2 in our favour at the final whistle.

Our opponents in the Final are not yet known, and it is likely that the final tie will not take place until the latter part of the season.

Combination Victory

Before an attendance of nearly 5,000 our Reserves gained a couple of points in Division I of the Combination last Saturday, defeating Luton Town Reserves by the only goal of a match in which the Hammers held the advantage for most of the time. That the margin was not greater was largely due to the efforts of goalkeeper Bernard Streten, who once more showed his abilities to advantage before an Upton Park audience. As so often in the past, Streten foiled our forwards time and time again, and it was only in a second-half goalmouth melee that he finally succumbed; this performance followed his being dropped from the First XI after 50 successive first-string appearances.

Naturally our chaps were disappointed at not gaining a bigger victory, but they proved that they are again strong contenders for the Combination championship, and by this win improved their position in the table. Nevertheless they will face a stiff task at Highbury this afternoon.

Floodlight Date with Milan

Our floodlight friendly against A.C. Milan has now been provisionally arranged for Monday, 13th December. We have had to put this back a week from the original date owing to the Italy v Argentine international match which takes place on December 5th; five of the Milan team have been selected for Italy on that occasion, including Nordahl and Schiaffino who have become naturalised Italians, and it was impracticable for Milan to play here on the following day for that would have meant the exclusion of these players from their team. It is obvious, however, that against a side of such strength we shall have to be right on our toes to maintain our unbeaten "floodlight record" at Upton Park, but having beaten off foreign competition in the past we feel sure that our chaps can do it again against the Italian champions.

The only seats reserved for this game will be those held by Season Ticket Holders, and it is useless to make application for other bookings. However, there will be plenty of accommodation available, and we anticipate at least a 30,000 attendance. Tickets will be sent to Season Ticket holders as soon as possible.
