Behind them, Aherne, on his 200th appearance was in complete command, and although Dunne was sometimes troubled by the speed of Small, his powers of recovery stood him in good stead.

When the forwards hit their best after the interval it was a brilliant best, in which they produced fine, forceful football, and showed great finishing power.

Ably led again by Morton, whose role was provider of chances, rather than that of an opportunist in this match, they worried this previously-sound Forest defence into mistakes.

Morton kept his line moving, and there was good support for him at inside-forward, with Cumminian sweeping out some grand passes and Turner again a dangerous spearhead and dong much work in midfield as well.

In the second half they looked a different attack allogether, and there was a good response from the wingers, with Davies laying on a number of centres and Cullen showing a marked improvement on his previous appearance at outside-left.
