

CUP IS STILL HERE

Town Outclass Watford Rivals

Playing fast, constructive football that Watford could never even start to match, the Town had no difficulty in retaining the Rigby Taylor Cup at Vicarage-road on Monday night and they gave 6,185 spectators a splendid exhibition in the first half.

Chief difference between the teams was that the Town began their constructive moves back in defence with every player trying to make good use of the ball, whereas Watford were too prone to boot the ball hard and hope for the best.

That they did not continue in this vein for the whole game was probably due in large measure to the sobering effect caused by injuries to Groves and Baynham.

The former went over on an ankle just before half-time and was replaced by MacEwan while, quite early in the second half, Baynham diving at the feet of Cook, received a kick on the shoulder and was immediately taken off and Streten took over in goal.

In a League match, both would have carried on, but the Town were not prepared to risk aggravation of the damage in either case.

With the game well won anyway, the Town for the last half an hour, were mostly content to hold on to the two goal lead gained in the first half.

TURNER put them ahead with a splendid shot taken on the drop after a brilliant movement between Davies and Groves and GROVES got the second from close range after his first attempt had struck the bar.

Another good movement led to this, with Turner and Davies involved on this occasion.

GROVES HAD ONE DISALLOWED

Earlier, Groves had headed through beautifully from a corner in much the same style as he did against Rotherham, but the goal was disallowed because the referee thought he had put his hands on Shipwright's shoulders.

What this match did serve to underline is that the Town have really had a brainwave in converting Groves into a centre-forward.

His body swerves, his fine control of the ball and his distribution of it, worried Shipwright a lot and he played an outstanding part in the Town's first half supremacy.

However, the whole team played well during this period, with Cummins parting with the ball just at the right time, Turner always a dangerous raider and a good response from the wingers.

Nor was the defence in much trouble, with Morton again dominating in the middle and keeping a tight grip on Cook.

So confident were the Town defence that Dunne made a couple of runs down the outside-right position and nearly scored on one occasion with a shot that fully tested Gooch.

Aherne easily mastered Brown and the wing halves completed the mastery of a Watford attack that sadly lacked the scheming powers of Bowie.

When MacEwan came in, he had a bright opening, but when the rest of the team put the brake on and were content to coast along, he suffered from lack of opportunity.

A BOLD MOVE PAID BIG DIVIDENDS

Groves Led The Forwards Like An Old Hand

Giving a display in keeping with their promotion ambitions, despite having to make changes in key positions, the Town gained an easy victory over Fulham, who proved to be a far less formidable proposition than they appeared on paper.

This was a case in which a bold move paid off handsomely, for it was certainly boldness to put John Groves in at centre-forward for the first time in his career as the solution to the problem left by the moving of Bob Morton to centre-half.

Groves, all of whose previous League team experience had been at inside-left, led the line like an old hand at the job. Continually picking up the loose ball in midfield, he kept the attack on the move with well-judged passes.

In the second half, he became quite a spearhead, too, and proved a lively handful for Greenwood and scored one of the best goals seen on the ground this season.

It came after 59 minutes and counted as the Town's second. There seemed no danger to Fulham when GROVES challenged Greenwood for the ball near the left wing.

The centre-forward won the tussle, turned inside for goal, leaving Greenwood floundering and surprised Black with a low shot from a most acute angle that sent the ball racing into the far corner of the net.

That really sealed the Town's victory, though there had been no particular danger since TURNER gave them the lead after 22 minutes.

AN IN-OFF GOAL

In a way, it was an odd goal, for Turner headed a corner by Davies against the bar and the ball after bouncing upwards, spun down again under the bar and finally went in off Chenhall, who was seeking to make a goal-line save.

Both before this happened and afterwards, the Town were the more polished, assured side on going that was anything but easy.

Most of the pitch was heavy after the thaw, but there was a snowy, well-sanded patch in front of the stand which was a tremendous hazard for those unfortunate enough to have to play on it.

To both sets of conditions, the Town adapted themselves the better and they owed much of their supremacy to the grip which the half-back line took on the middle of the field.

Result was that Fulham's forwards had few opportunities to launch an effective attack, especially as Jezard was literally put out of the game by Morton, and we saw little of the dash that usually characterises this leader.

All the same, Fulham tried to play to him, but the Town covering was so effective that no gaps were left, and there never seemed much danger that there would be other than a clean sheet.

NON-STOP WING HALVES

Non-stop work by Pemberton and Shanks put the Fulham inside forwards out of the game and with Dunne winning his tussle with Mitten and Aherne completely holding Barton, the Fulham attack was largely an innocuous affair.

Behind them was Baynham, who although he did not have a great deal to do, showed that his confidence is unimpaired by the unfortunate happenings to him the week before.

Almost immediately after he scored, Groves had the ball in the net again.

on the grounds of offside, the referee disallowed it.

Most people thought that the ball came back to Groves off a Fulham defender and there was some surprise at the decision.

However, with 13 minutes left, TURNER emphasised the Town's superiority by rounding off a clever movement by Davies and Groves.

There was much thrustful work by Turner and a return to his best by Cummins, who worked tremendously hard in midfield.

From the wingers, there was not quite sufficient finishing power, though Davies made a marked improvement in the second half. Cullen worried Chenhall, but his passing was not always accurate and there were times when he delayed his pass too long.
