Recall of MacEwan paid off handsome dividends, too, for he led the line intelligently, linking up with his inside-forwards and was a constant source of worry to the visiting defence with his harassing tactics.

The added directness that the new set-up brought suited Turner, who was the man who turned the tide for the Town when the circumstances looked none too propitious and he was constantly probing away at the defence.

It was TURNER who gave the Town the lead after 10 minutes when he beat King from a pass by DAVIES, who had the distinction of heading the second goal from a corner by Pemberton. Davies's part in these two goals earned him credit marks even though he was not very consistent.

MORTON DID NOT SETTLE DOWN

Apart from the shaky spell they had for about 20 minutes when Port Vale did the damage, the defence seemed perfectly capable of holding a forward line that did not show much thrust all through the first half.

One of the troubles was that Morton did not settle down at right-half, which is not to be wondered at after his long spell in the forward line, and he probably needed this game in which to re-adjust himself to the change.

Owen had rather a lot of covering to do and was drawn out of the middle by Done rather more than is usual for

him, with the result that unexpected gaps appeared. Yet, on the whole, Owen made a good job of holding the experienced Done, but the most successful member of the middle line was Shanks, who gave a clever, non-stop display.

There was more threat to the Town from the left wing than the right for, on the latter, Shanks and the hard-tackling Aherne were much in the ascendancy.

However, Dunne came through successfully despite having quite a lot of extra work thrown upon him and Baynham gave another highly confident and capable display.
