OUR VISITORS

It was on April 11th, 1885, that a meeting in Luton Town Hall discussed the formation of a local football club. The enthusiasts who attended did not need much persuading, and it was duly decided that "a Luton Town Football Club" should be established. It is an amusing sidelight on the customs of those pioneer days that the meeting also decided that the club colours should be navy blue and pink, a shirt and cap to be worn by each member when playing.

Scaffold poles were bought for goalposts, a field known as "Dallow Lane" rented and a ball provided, and the new club was off on the long road to stardom.

By 1891 amateur status had been abandoned and Luton Town was a professional club, certain of their players being paid 5/- a week, whilst others were allowed 2/6 for home games, 6d. extra for away matches and reasonable time lost prior to 12.0 noon.

In 1894 the Southern League embraced them and "friendlies" became a thing of the past. Luton Town did well in this competition, and by 1897 had found their way into the Second Division of the Football League.

The officials soon found that the life of a Football League side is not "roses, roses all the way". After two disastrous seasons Luton left the Football League and returned to the Southern League. Here they remained until the Third Divisions were formed.

It has been a long and hard struggle since then, but today the Luton Town supporters point proudly to their side at long last wearing the proud Division I label.

Luton Town only last week travelled to Spain to play a match, and on Friday returned to this country to play Sheffield Wednesday in a friendly fixture at the week-end.

With injuries causing them some little trouble the composition of the side is not certain, but here are some details of their leading players.

■ **Ron BAYNHAM**, Birmingham-born goalkeeper whom we do not remember seeing play at The Hawthorns before. He is no stranger to the ground, however, having visited us in England team training parties.

Seamus DUNNE, Eire International right back, born at Wicklow. Formerly played for Drogheda United.

Tom AHERNE, perhaps better known as "Bud", another Irish International, once with Belfast Celtic. Born at Limerick and with Luton since 1949.

Jim PEMBERTON, from nearby Stourbridge in 1949 is quite happy to play in any position. He has appeared at full back, wing half, inside forward and outside left.

Terry KELLY is a local boy who came into the limelight with Vauxhall Motors. His father Tim Kelly has recently left Luton to manage Bedford Town. Kelly has recently played centre half in place of Sid Owen who has a pulled muscle.

Wally SHANKS, born in Malta of Scottish parents, prefers to play left half but can also show up at inside or outside forward.

Roy DAVIES, South African born has been struggling to reach peak fitness after a cartilage operation and has shared the right wing position with Michael Cullen. Cullen is a Scot from Douglasdale Juniors in 1952. He is not a one-footed player and has featured prominently on the other flank.

Gordon TURNER, goalscoring inside right who hails from Hull where his father played for Hull City with manager of Luton, Mr. "Dally" Duncan. Has had several honours but a full cap has as yet eluded him.

John GROVES, a young inside forward who has been doing well lately. He has been with Luton since he left school. Another footballer's son—his father was Mr. Duncan's colleague and contemporary at Derby County.

Bob MORTON, a most valuable man to the side, almost indispensable at centre half in Owen's absence. Sadly missed at wing half, but practically irreplaceable at centre forward. Born at Aston Clinton, Morton has been with Luton nearly ten seasons.

George CUMMINS, Eire International inside forward from Dublin. Signed from Everton in 1953 after three seasons with the "Toffeemen".

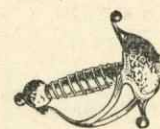
Jimmy ADAM a Scot from over the border. Adam who plays outside left has recently been down with tonsillitis. He has had just over two seasons at Luton.

Reg PEARCE, a youngster signed from Winsford United. Pearce is showing outstanding promise and can play both outside and inside left.

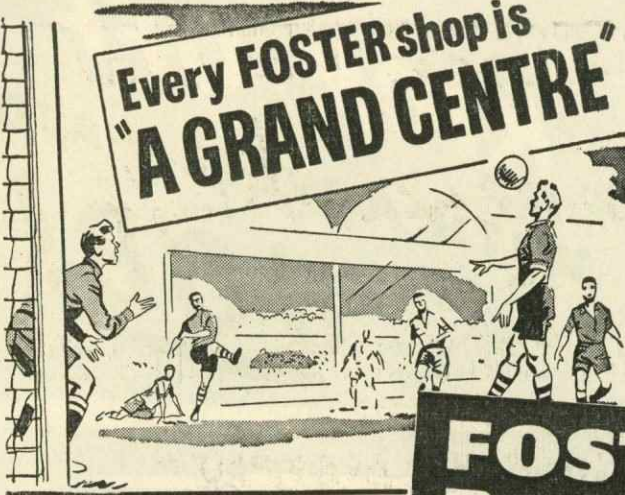

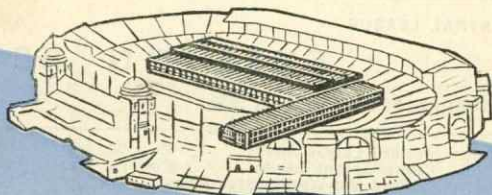
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
