GROVES, AHERNE AND PEMBERTON ARE IN

Injury-Hit Team's Great Fight At Wolverhampton

INJURIES, plus the well-deserved selection of Bob Morton to play for England "B" against Switzerland "B" at Southampton, posed problems for the Town in choosing their team to meet Bedford Town in the final of the Bedfordshire Professional Cup tomorrow night.

Out of the running are Gordon Turner and Leslie Jones, both of whom damaged ankle ligaments at Wolverhampton on Saturday, but there are some hopes of both being fit for the home match with Aston Villa, though doubt is likely to exist until the end of the

week.

THE vacancies are being filled in much the way we expected. with Bud Aherne regaining the left-back position which he lost through injury and then could not regain because of the consistent play of Jones. To replace Morton and Turner.

the Town had the alternative of playing Jim Pemberton or John Groves in the middle line, or either in attack. Decision that has been reached

is to keep Groves at half-back. where he has been doing extremely well for the Reserves, and to enable him to play at left-half Wally Shanks is moving over to the right, something that will cause him no inconvenience.

Pemberton In At Inside-Left THOUGH Pemberton had a long

spell at right-half this season, he is being used tomorrow night at inside-left, where he played with success at Watford last week. and this is a position to which he is no stranger. To allow him to come in there,

Reg. Pearce is being switched to inside-right, which is his natural position, though he has never had a first-team outing there. While a couple of other players
