Villa Had Chances To Build Up Lead

Little Satisfaction From Town's Display

IT was after that the Town came nearest to looking like a team capable of holding a place in the upper half of the table, but, even so, it was a display that did not give much cause for general satisfaction.

In the end their lead could have been more convincing but for some poor finishing, and Pemberton missed the easiest chance of all when he lifted the ball over the bar from close in.

That miss and others could have proved expensive, for only the vigilance of Baynham prevented Smith from gaining a last-minute equaliser in almost the only coalworthy attack they made after going into arrears.

Injuries Have Had Effect On Attack


