Extra Punch Brought To Attack By Inclusion Of George McLeod By Chiltern

THESE were welcome points to end a rather depressing run by the Town, who were superior to struggling Charlton, but had something of a fright in the early part of the second half.

In the end, they were indebted largely to the opportunism of Gordon Turner, who ended a blank spell that has lasted some weeks, with a fine "hat trick" in the course of which he took his total of League goals for the Town to 101.

No other Town player since the war has accomplished this feat and that Turner has again found his shooting boots is an encouraging sign, especially in view of the nearness of the Cuptie.

by Duff enabled them to take the lead in the 14th minute when CULLEN shot during a melee and the ball spun out of Duff's hands to bounce over the line. That lead lasted exactly a

minute and then a crisp movement left STEWART with a chance to beat Streten for his first goal in League football. After that, though, the Town

Charlton firmly into the game again after 65 minutes and the Town's lead seemed more than a little precarious at that stage. Then it was TURNER to the

rescue again four minutes later when he beat Duff with a shot taken on the volley from McLeod's centre. Charlton had defensive weak-

nesses that were not really exploited to the full, but there was more punch about the Town front line, due in no small measure to the introduction of McLeod. Working all the time and showing football ability in addi-

tion to dash, he made a most successful debut as a leader. TOOK SOME OF THE

WEIGHT Turner stole the limelight with his finishing, but Morton worked

hard at inside-left, taking much of the weight off his inside colleagues and, even he looked at times as if he were playing out of position, as, of course, he was. This is an experiment that can be said to have been successful. Not so much thrust as had been expected came from the

wings where Gregory failed to cash in on an obvious weakness at right-back, but, at the same time, he looked a potential scorer more than once and it is scorers the Town are looking for. On his return, Cullen had only a moderate match against that accomplished defender. Hewie. In fine form again, Streten made several superb saves during the times that Charlton were

threatening and Jones and Aherne kept the extreme wingers very quiet. While Jones carried coolness to extremes at times, he was an able deputy for Dunne, and

Owen, although worried occasionally by the dash of Summers, especially when Ryan was coming through, too, was a fine mainstay. Neither Pemberton nor Shanks consistently gained a grip on the middle of the field and their distribution was often faulty.

Some surprise was occasioned in the early part of the second half when the floodlights were switched on, but for only six minutes, because there was an objection by the Charlton man-
