when from a back pass by Moir, Franklin centred a glorious cross which Jackson, running in at full speed, met with his head to flash the ball past Baynham and put County ahead after three minutes.

Luton looked the more polished

side in midfield for a spell after this, but the goal danger always threatened from Stockport.

The looked-for revival by Luton

because Stockport, and particularly Holden, didn't allow it. After 58 minutes Holden sent the County supporters almost hysterical with the goal of a lifetime.

Miskick

Sid Owen miskicked just inside

his own half and Holden ran 40 yards, resisting challenges from Owen and Dunne, before placing the ball calmly past Baynham.

From then on Luton were a

from time Stockport sliced through the Luton defence with an almost half-pace Clempson-Jackson-Finney move which left Holden alone in front of Baynham to crash in Stockport's third. Even allowing for a shaky Luton defence which got the Holden

defence which got the Holden jitters early on, there was no fluke about this victory. It was a triumph of skill and

was never allowed to find its feet.

MATCH VERDICT.—On this
display Stockport are going to be
as tough Cup opposition at
Edgeley as any of their more
exalted rivals are likely to find.
Lesson for Luton is the need for

tightening up a defence which had big gaps on either side of centre half Sid Owen.
