CHAMPIONSHIP-HUNTING Luton, of the solid defence and sharp-shooting attack, were striding confidently towards another two points at Turf Moor against Burnley, and it looked as if they had taken everything Burnley could give.

After the interval, driven on by McIlroy, Burnley battered away at this stonewall Luton defence, which was magnificently marshalled by centre-half Owen and backed by a sure goalkeeper in Baynham.
