But it was only a clumsy attempt to clear by Sid Owen that let in Dennis Viollet for No. 1. It was only fatal and needless hesitation that allowed Warren Bradley to tee-up a second for rocket-shot Bobby Charlton.

Luton thereafter cut out the carelessness and looked a competent and occasionally dangerous side.

As their confidence grew, so United's high-strung impulsive attack flickered and flashed like a light bulb about to go.

When tireless inside-left George Cummins put one in for Luton United wavered.

Came the second half. Crack-shot Gordon Turner slammed a penalty—awarded for a Gregg rough tackle on Bingham—straight at Gregg and that was the end of Luton's challenge.

Towards the close Bradley very nearly wriggled through three times and brilliant Albert Quixall had a first-timer booted off the line.

It was a fast, thrilling game most of the time. Top honours go to Dennis Viollet, who, besides striking up a formidable partnership with Bradley, held his line together superbly

New boy Joe Carolan, at left-back never looked quite at ease, but showed the touches at the right times—a footballer's main job.
