

NOW FOR THE CUP REPLAY

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TOMORROW



FIGHTING fit, is this morning's report from Kenilworth-road. Fighting fit, and determined to be in the fifth round of the F.A. Cup after tomorrow night's floodlit replay against Leicester City.

With a little more luck, a bit more punch in front of goal, they could have scuppered the City at Filbert-street, on Saturday. Luton adapted themselves quicker to a pitch as hard as an ice rink and a ball as stubborn as a mule.

Still, there's always tomorrow night.

It was on the cards that the team which punched home the first goal could finish winners. And McNeill made it 1-0 for the City after a 50th minute mix-up in the Luton penalty area.

Then Billy Bingham, the man who scored two against Leeds United, popped into the picture and almost walked home the equaliser in a 77th minute solo effort. He chased a loose ball, waltzed through a dithering defence, and tapped it into the net.
