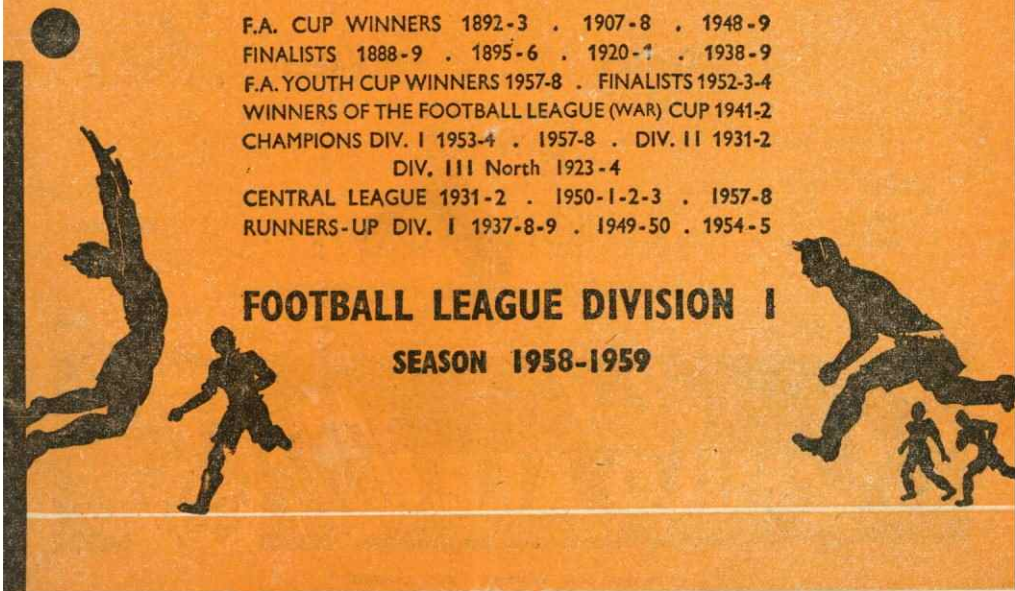

Tributes have been paid to him by the high and the lowly, the near and the far, but there will be none more sincere than those that come from the hearts of the Wolverhampton people among whom Billy Wright is, as they say "One of us."

It was a testing week-end and they came through it magnificently overcoming more than one obstacle that would have proved too much for many a lesser team.

At Bolton it was necessary to play without Peter Broadbent and Ron Flowers as well as Billy but the reserves rose to the occasion as they have done so often in the past. So well did they play indeed that they were denied victory only by an element of luck.

Then at Blackpool there was the unfortunate injury to Bobby Mason who had to be left in a local hospital when the rest of the party returned to Wolverhampton.

### ANOTHER WHO SHOWED RIGHT SPIRIT

IT was a fantastic coincidence that Bobby Mason should suffer an eye injury so similar to that which had kept Eddie Stuart out of the game and so rare.

Everybody hopes he will suffer no after effects and that he will come back as gamely as did Stuart a display of whose true club spirit proved such a boon at Blackpool.

He so badly wanted to play that he took upon himself the possible risk of further injury. The matter was left entirely with him and he played a grand part in that outstanding victory. That was a demonstration of the best tradition of the club if ever there was one and we are proud to feel we have such men with the club interests so much at heart.

### TWO MORE TO REMEMBER

SINCE this has become a week of congratulation there are two more players who should not be forgotten today. They, of course, are Ron Flowers and Peter Broadbent who had the opportunity of sharing in Billy Wright's big day at Wembley.

They also brought further distinction to their club and helped maintain the fine record in internationals which has gone unbroken now for more than 20 years.

All in all, then, this is a day for high spirits and a day on which we look forward to such another wholehearted display as those that made the week-end so profitable.

There will be another chance to see the First Team when they play Leicester City next Wednesday and everybody hopes when we go to Everton next Saturday it will be as Champions of the Football League once more.

That would be a fitting climax to this outstanding month.



# Today's Topical Talk

THE 10½ against 10 men match at Blackpool leaves the Wolves with two points to get from three matches to retain the League Championship and European Cup entry. The victory would appear to have been vital, as the title now seems truly within reach.

What a struggle it was at Blackpool! The Bloomfield Road team went all out to retain their place in the first four and, with it, of course, the League bonus. But the Wolves had the solidity and power the home team lacked, and the goal by Murray from Lill's first-half corner-kick decided the battle.

I have always been a believer in fast corners and when the Wolves' centre-forward, rising like a salmon to a fly, got his head to the ball it flashed into the net before Farm in goal could even shape to save. His expression recalled the first World War cartoon of Bruce Bairnsfather with its caption, "Where did that one go to!"

It's too soon to shout but two points from three matches looks a good thing, and Manchester United have to win both games to make even that challenge.

## MEET THE FINALISTS

WELCOME to the F.A. Cup Finalists. Luton Town arrive at Molineux in the unaccustomed role of a glamour team. This, if they'll forgive my saying so, is the Season of the Unexpected in the Cup . . . more so than usual, since the upsets have continued to the end.

Generally the surprises fade out in the semi-finals, and Big Shots fill the Final-tie. This time, it's Luton Town v. Nottingham Forest, otherwise a newcomer versus a club which hasn't seen the Final for over half a century — 61 years, to be exact.

The man-in-the-street says it was a thousand to one against these two teams reaching Wembley, but the peculiarities or uncertainties persist to the finish. Mark this: just over a week ago the pair met in the League at Luton and today's Molineux guests won by the startling margin of 5-1. That's a smack in the eye no-one can ignore. Whatever view you take of it, you must admit it gave encouragement to the winners. So a word of warning to today's guests can't do any harm.

## WEMBLEY WARNING

WHAT happened? Billy Walker, the Nottingham manager, said "This won't do at all," threatened all sorts of things, recalled the full Cup eleven for Saturday's visit to Everton, and saw the Forest come back with a bang and win by 3-1 after playing highly impressive football. I was there. So I warn these friends from Luton that the 5-1 affair may well have been a snare and a delusion: on this Everton showing the Forest will call for every bit of craft and courage the Bedfordshire side can muster. Surprising how well little Gray played — a shining star at inside-forward after being released by both Chelsea and Burnley as an outside man.

Luton have accounted for First, Second and Third Division opponents on the way to Wembley. They slaughtered Leeds, survived at Leicester, Ipswich and Blackpool, and then removed the song-birds of Norwich — the season's sensation — in the semi-final. So they're no homesters, as the autograph-hunters say. Apparently both Finalists had towsy tests last Saturday. It was certainly hectic at Everton, and reports say the same of Manchester United's match at Luton — only more so.

## FOOTBALLER OF THE YEAR

LUTON owe much to Birmingham-born Syd Owen, and thereby hangs a query. On Monday the Football Writers' Association may name the Footballer of the Year, and the general expectation is that the honour rests between today's two captains — Billy Wright, who would receive the award for the second time, and the man who is, likewise, skipper and centre-half of Luton Town. He has been the side's sheet-anchor, and it's a fitting, as well as romantic, finale to his playing career that he should lead the team to Wembley. But there are other stars and stalwarts, of course.

This was their semi-final team — the one which silenced "the Canaries": Baynham; McNally, Hawkes; Groves, Owen, Pacey; Bingham, Brown, Morton, Cummins and Gregory. Ron Baynham, born Birmingham, joined Luton from Worcester City and was England's goalkeeper in 1956. Brendan McNally's one of the several Eire players who have settled successfully at Luton. Tall John Groves was formerly a forward — he's from Derby — and David Pacey is from Hitchin in Herts: he was hurt last Saturday.

## 50 DAYS "HARD"

IT'S the attack that intrigues. Why Sunderland allowed little Bingham, the Irish International, to depart, I wouldn't know. When I'm around he generally moves like a match-winner. Allan Brown's the unlucky fellow from Fife and Blackpool who has missed several Wembley honours through injury. Bob Morton, of England "B", is the capable long-service handy-man of the club. George Cummins is the dangerous Eire International from Everton F.C., and Tom Gregory's a tall, local outside-left.

They'll all be playing hard today to keep the machine oiled and moving as smoothly as possible. But I'll wager Luton will join the long list of Finalists who say the 50 days interval between semi-final and Final's all too long. Even sober Stanley Matthews called it "torture."

Study them! The total for the full First Division programme was roughly a quarter of a million. Quite a few of these attendances should have been doubled. What's wrong? Is the public weary of the long season? No, it's weary of the excessively long League programme, of its sameness. If these had been Cup-ties the crowds would have been two or three times as large.

The Fourth Division is being overhauled; it's time the Football League as a whole was overhauled, the number of prizes to be played-for increased, and shorter competitions introduced more in keeping with these streamlined times. In these expensive days, no club can afford this end-of-the-season slump.

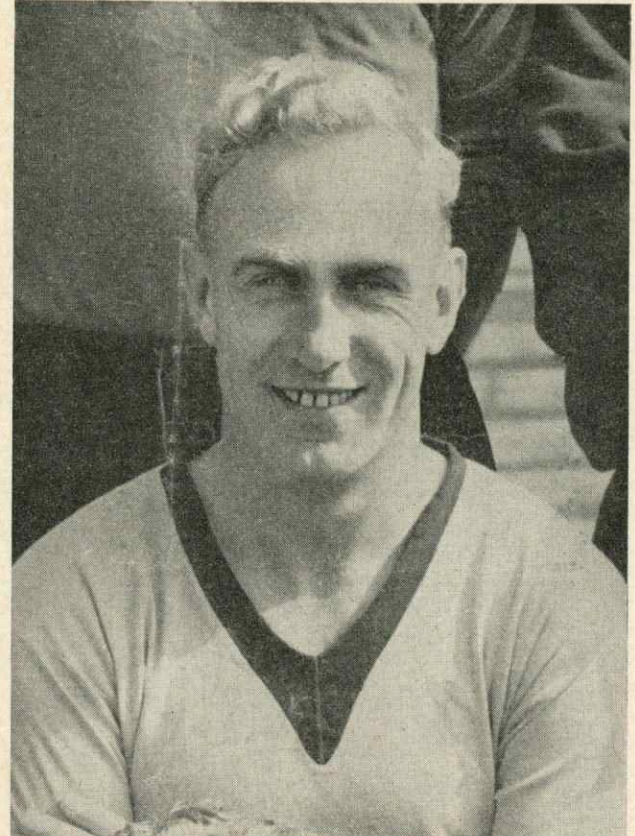
