

PENALTY SAVE DRAMA

^{58/59} *Forgotten man Dunne is hero of Luton victory*

Luton 3, Portsmouth 1
S EAMUS DUNNE,
Luton's Eire inter-
national right back,
came back from the
shadows to win himself
a brief flash of Soccer
fame against Ports-
mouth last night.

Forgotten man Dunne,
now only a Luton reserve,
pulled on injured goal-
keeper Ron Baynham's
green jersey in the four-
teenth minute, smilingly
accepted the challenge of a
Peter Harris penalty kick
—AND SAVED IT.

Baynham was hurt giv-
ing away the penalty as he
dived at the feet of outside
right Harris.

He came back after get-
ting treatment for a head
injury.

This was only the
second victory in ten
games for Luton, the Cup
Finalists.

And it was schemed by
another Eire star—slim in-
side right George Cum-
mins.

Paralysed

Last night he paralysed
struggling Portsmouth —
already doomed to the
Second Division—with his
cultured control and super
ball-distribution.

In the thirty-sixth
minute he slid a pass
through the Pompey de-
fence, for left half Dave
Pacey to give Luton the
lead.

Then, after Peter Harris
had equalised for Pompey
with a header in the 47th

minute, Cummins really
turned on the heat.

In the fifty-fifth minute
he found Gordon Turner
with another inch-perfect
pass for the inside right to
hammer in No. 2.

And then he even had
the Portsmouth players
applauding when he scored
with a glorious chip to
make it 3-1 for Luton.

He drew 'keeper Fred
Brown and his full backs
off the goal-line and placed

the ball perfectly, just
under the bar.

Luton nearly grabbed a
fourth when Turner—look-
ing a better player after
his goal—powered a Cum-
mins cross on the volley.

**Spiritless Pompey had
little to offer.**

In the first half they
looked as though they
might make a game of it.

There was some promis-
ing stuff from Jimmy
White, sixteen-year-old
Pompey inside right star-
let. But for Luton, even
with four reserves, this
was the easiest of pre-
Wembley canters.
