IT'S an odd Soccer world. Gordon Turner, the man for whom a place could not be found in Luton's Wembley side last season, is suddenly the man everybody at Luton wants to see back.

Confirming that it is an odd Soccer world is Don Revie, whose departures from his two previous clubs, Manchester City and Sunderland were hardly marked by expressions of regret.

The new, urbane Revie has taken over more than just the Leeds captaincy. He has taken over the whole team. Now they are playing Revie-fashion, ball on ground and moving quickly.

The team revolves round Revie, and it gave the most encouraging display I have seen from any Leeds side in recent seasons.
