WHEN these teams, Luton Town and Nottingham Forest, last met it was at Wembley before a crowd of 100,000, but ten minutes before kick-off time at Kenilworth-road this afternoon, I doubt whether there were 12,000 on the ground. These included a solid knot of Forest supporters, gaily bedecked in red and white colours, almost bang in the middle of the Bobbers stand.

There was time for the attendance to grow and had the Town's record this season been better, this was the sort of match that would surely have attracted 25,000.

Forest, who completed a double over Sheffield Wednesday in mid-week, were unchanged, but the Town were struck a double blow yesterday when Eire Internationals Brendan McNally and George Cummins were found to be unfit.

This illustrated the sort of luck that has attended the Town this season, and it caused considerable changing of the side that gained the first win of the season at Manchester on Wednesday.

Back to right-half went Bob Morton, which paved the way for a return by Gordon Turner, relegated to the role of 12th man on Wednesday.

To fill the vacancy left by Cummins, Barry Hawkes switched to inside-left and was partnered by Tony Gregory, who had been left out of the last four matches.


