Struggling Town Are Out Of Luck As Well As Form

IT was very much the mixture as before at The Hawthorns on Saturday, with the Town attack again mis-firing and, eventually, the defence caving in so that in the end, their arrears could have been greater.

At the same time, luck is running against them, otherwise they could have put themselves back into this game with a chance and given themselves the encouragement to make a greater fight than they did.

In the first place they had what they thought was a perfectly good goal by Brown disallowed, almost immediately after ALEN had given West Bromwich the lead with 16 minutes gone.

Seventeen minutes later ALLEN increased the lead with a terrific drive from outside the penalty area that simply rocketed into the roof of the net.

Morton matched this effort just before half-time, but his luck was out because Wallace just managed to reach the ball with his finger tips and deflected it on to the bar. There was a period during the second half when the Town moved with a bit more assurance, and during that period Bingham hit the post and Turner saw a great first-time shot go straight at the fortunate Wallace.

But these incidents were rare jewels in what was really a disappointing display, and West Bromwich, in the last quarter of an hour, over-ran a defence that had been struggling throughout.

WHITEHOUSE increased the lead 14 minutes from time, and KEVAN headed the fourth five minutes later. Twice after that

Brown again gave the appearance of a player struggling to regain some semblance of form; Turner was in the picture for brief periods, and Kilgannon could only demonstrate how urgent is the Town's need for an outside-left.

Much of the damage to the

Town defence was eqused by Jackson, who has only recently been converted into a winger, but he had too much speed and resource for Hawkes, who came off very much second best.

The need to try to cover up weaknesses made Groves's centrehalf job all the more difficult, and there were times when he could not avoid leaving the middle unguarded.

Morton was more consistent and stronger than Pacey, who

did not show his old dominance in the tackle, and Dunne was fairly adequate against Aitken.

Handicapped by another knock on his damaged thigh muscle, Baynham gave a brave performance, making several brilliant

saves, but has to take some blame for the first and last goals, slips doubtless brought about by the greasiness of the ball.
