# GROVES STARS AT CENTRE-HALF

### Town Fight On To Narrow Victory

AFTER a match that opened most unpromisingly for them, the Town fought their way to a narrow victory over Liverpool at Kenilworth-road last night.

It was a game which changed almost completely once the Town took the lead towards half-time.

Liverpool, had they shown resource in front of goal, could have built up a comfortable lead. So, in effect, the changes the Manager made reaped reward, and the most successful of them by far was the inclusion of

The attendance was 10,055, one of the lowest for the Town for some time, but this could be traced to the heavy rain before

the start.

Early play favoured Liverpool

and, with Hunt preferred to Hickson as their leader, moved much
more confidently in attack, and
Milne shot wide. Because they
were keeping the ball too close
and finding their passes intercepted, the Town's efforts to make
ground were breaking down.

When they did break away, the
referee allowed to pass a blatant

case of obstruction on Turner. When at last a clear-cut chance was made by Pacey, Brown shot weakly wide.

Such was the standard of the

finishing of both teams that the

best scoring attempt came when Dunne very nearly put through his own goal in clearing from Leishman, and Baynham had to pull off a flying save.

From this, Bingham livened up the Town by appearing on the left wing and making a shot that Slater pulled down. The more

persistent pressure was still coming from Liverpool, but their finishing was poor, and both Harrower and Melia sent wide.

In fact, defenders had been their best marksmen so far, and Baynham made another fine save from Leishman. Melia missed a great chance when he lobbed the ball straight at Baynham after

Groves had been deceived by its bounce.

Leishman continued to be a danger as a marksman, and he produced a fine 20-yards drive that Baynham, showing more confidence on this occasion, saved at full-length.

After 32 minutes the Town took

The winger's fierce cross shot was saved by Slater, who, however, on the ground, could not prevent the ball bouncing away from him, and BROWN raced up to bang it through. A minute later Turner hooked the ball inches wide.

After this success the Town showed a major improvement sweeping Liverpool back on to the defensive and Slater saved well from McBride. Half-time:

Reverting to some extent to the short passing that had caused them so much trouble earlier on, the Town lost some of the sparkle they had shown in the last quarter of an hour before half-time.

As a result, Liverpool forced
