DRAMATIC GOAL SAVES TOWN IN LAST MINUTE

IN dramatic fashion at Liverpool last night, Luton Town retained an interest in the Football League Cup by forcing a draw when Brogan marked his first-ever appearance in the side by securing an unexpected equaliser.

Before a crowd of 10,502 who paid £1,465. Luton Town earned marks for a plucky fight that was an improvement on their showing in their last two away

matches.

The latest changes brought more soundness in defence and extra liveliness in attack,
