BELOW-PAR LUTON MAKE IT FOUR WINS IN A ROW

LUTON ploughed their way to an undistinguished fourth consecutive victory yesterday, but their form against struggling Huddersfield was not up to their recent revival standard. It was a scrappy match, in which both attacks got themselves into a tangle.

This gave two reasonably solid defences an afternoon in which they were able to end the few tricky situations which arose with confidence. John Bramwell, who is justifiably being given most credit for Luton's newly achieved title look in defence, shaped far more like an England left back than Huddersfield's Ray Wilson.

But the urgent, forceful Wilson struggled his hardest to promote a late Huddersfield rally that threatened to save a point.

Luton's raids outnumbered Huddersfield's by at least 2-1, yet home goalkeeper Standen was forced to produce more goal-saving brilliance than Fearnley. He made two great saves from inside-right Kerray in the first half, and prevented a possible equaliser near the end from outside-left O'Grady.

Outside-right Tracey should have been able to put Luton ahead after 30 minutes when Fearnley was stranded near the penalty spot, but from five yards he was unable to place his shot out of the goalkeeper's reach.

Centre-forward Turner shot the

only goal after 49 minutes. Right-half Morton slipped the ball through and Turner drew Fearnley before kicking out of his reach.

Turner came close to scoring again 11 minutes later, but his glancing header from outside-left Fleming's cross was wide.

Fleming, 18, pleased Luton fans in his first League game. He is strong, has excellent ball control, and a dangerous cross. Luton missed dashing wing-half Pacey. Besides Standen and Bramwell, their top men were centre-half Groves and inside-left Brown.

Huddersfield's best were centre-half Coddington and left-half Low, plus deputy centre-forward Milner, hardest trier of a weak attack.
