Stops Bigger Town Defeat

HOPES that the Town would be able to build last night on the promising foundation they made against Preston on Saturday, were shattered at Derby.

Often their raids broke down prematurely against the stern, fearless Derby tackling and they were able to create few clearcut openings.

The Town's defence battled gamely, but mostly it was a losing battle.

COPE COMES TO RESCUE

Danger was threatened by the Town from the start, through two probing runs by Walden, and from the second the ball flashed across the goal, just too far for Lornie to reach.

Derby's first threat came when Curry raced through the middle, but he was caught by a desperate tackle by Cope, and the ball ran

harmlessly loose.

Derby's robust style put them on top for a short time, and a dangerous situation was averted by Cope's hooking out a fierce centre from Swallow.

With the Derby pressure mounting, Cope made two more timely clearances as the ball was slapped hard across the face of the Town goal. However, the Town settled down again, only to be caught off-side twice in quick succession.

With a header that sent the ball clear at rocket-like speed, Young stopped a Town raid that developed on the left, and in the end Fleming put the ball cleanly into the hands of Oxford.

TURNER MISSES BY INCHES

Best scoring effort from either side was made by Turner. He fastened on to a pass from Lornie, and his shot from an angle missed the far post by inches.

Derby retaliated with a surprise long shot by Parry, to which Baynham had to throw himself

full length.

There was not much in it, but the Town were showing slightly the more constructive ability. The Derby forwards countered with much dash and enthusiasm, which gave them a good deal of the play.

Curiously, Derby's best scoring attempt came from full-back Barrowcliffe, who somehow penetrated into the Town penalty area to seize on a slip by Morton. He should have scored, but with only Baynham facing him he drove too high.

Bramwell got in the way of a shot from Swallow following a corner and, with Derby now shooting Baynham was kept busy.

He made another full-length save from a long-range effort by Young, and cleared again in desperate fashion after Roby had slipped through and had no-one

else to beat.

Less was being seen of the Town forwards now, but Lornie very nearly nipped in for the important first goal, but failed to hook the ball past the advancing goalkeeper.

Baynham continued to excel himself with great saves and he made another from Hutchinson when all seemed lost.
