"WE wuz robbed" is a boxing phrase one can apply with some justification to this remarkable game at Anfield, where Liverpool made terribly hard work of what appeared to be an easy assignment.

Home supporters will argue Liverpool were robbed, and I am inclined to agree with them on the point that at least they should have had a last-minute chance to clinch the victory with

a penalty.

As Liverpool stormed to the attack, having had the lead established by stand-in Lewis at the sixth minute wiped out by that opportunist Turner in 87 minutes, they had every man except goalkeeper Slater up.

A'Court headed against the bar and the ball came out for Callaghan and St. John to both try and force the ball through.

The ball was dropping just under the bar with goalkeeper Standen nowhere around when an arm shot up and it was an arm clothed in white.
