TWO AHEAD—THEN ROTHERHAM CAME STORMING BACK

AFTER a team had come away with a point from such formidable opposition as Sunderland, as Luton Town did last Saturday, it would seem reasonable to expect a better-than-average crowd at Kenilworth-road this afternoon especially since the Town had been unbeaten for five matches.

Rotherham may not be glamorous opposition, but they were third in the table this morning and are serious promotion aspirants, yet five minutes before the kick-off there were wide gaps in all parts of the ground.

After yesterday's torrential rain, which groundsman Tom King told me had put the pitch two inches under water in places, the pitch had made a good recovery.

Both teams made three forward changes. The Town, through injuries to Turner and Legate, moved Ashworth to centre-forward and brought in McGuffie and Fleming at inside-right and outside-left respectively.

On the other hand, Rotherham were strengthened by the return

were strengthened by the return of Kirkman and Taylor, who form the left wing. To make way for this partnership, Houghton, who has been at inside-left, switched to inside-right.

It was a cold, crisp sort of afternoon with fitful sunshine.

The Town defended the Oakroad end and made progress, but neat work between McKechnie and Ashworth was spoilt because McKechnie passed back to the centre-forward who had moved out on the wing and the result was an offside decision.

With 15 minutes gone a sharp break-away brought the Town their second goal, through WALDEN. He raced down the middle to chase a low through pass by Fleming and, showing good judgment, rammed the bal into the net as two defenders converged on him.

Two minutes later Rotherham scored through TAYLOR, who chased a long pass by Morgan As Standen came out trying to block the ball, the winger lifted it over his head into an empty

net.

The crowd were certainly getting value for money, with both teams playing open football.

Pacey saved the situation for the Town by throwing himself at a through pass, and Standen was able to scramble away a shot by Houghton.

TOWN IN LUCK'S WAY

The Town were in luck's way when Kirkman was left with a clear run to goal after the ball had been lobbed over Cope's head but he was flagged offside. Taylor hustled McNally into a mistake, and his shot, with Standen beaten, was much too close for comfort.

Ashworth, spending more time in midfield than had been expected, suddenly showed up in the Town's attack and struck the netting from a pass by

There was a stoppage while Cope and Pacey, who had collided had attention.

Slackness in midfield led to Rotherham drawing level after 28 minutes through SAWYER, who ook a pass from Kirkman and scored with a weak shot that rolled into the corner with Standen unsighted.

A minute later Rotherham were in the lead for the first time when more slackness in the Town defence developed and Kirkman shot from point-blank range. McNALLY made a gallant attempt to stop it, but the ball spun off his leg into the net for an "own goal."

McGUFFIE GOES NEAR AGAIN

McGuffie came within inches of putting the Town level when he raced through, but Ironside just managed to block his shot.
