LUTON, showing a new brand of fight and determination, shocked Division II leaders Liverpool yesterday. Only four wonder saves by goalkeeper Jimmy Furnell kept the score down.

In no way did Liverpoot look like League leaders. Their much-vaunted their attack, but even this failed nationals, was outsmarted at every turn by a Luton defence that has found soundness since the recall of Terry Kelly to centre half.

Yet Ashworth and Turner were the ones who suffered from the brilliance of Furnell whose height enabled him to make incredible saves

On the other hand, Luton goalkeeper Jim Standen was never in trouble, which was surprising in view of the reputation of the

Liverpool forward line.

Perhaps Luton played above themselves but they make a habit of taking points from promotion teams. They have had three from Liverpool this season and did the double over Ipswich last season.
