WHY did Luton win?

Because they were the better side.

How were they better than the Second Division leaders?

They had more fire, resolution and ideas . . and they took nothing for granted.

It was Luton's best performance since their November draw at Liverpool. But for three superb saves by giant £20,000 goal-keeper Furnell it would have been a more convincing win.

Another reason for Luton's 100 p.c. improvement was the new sense of security brought by centre-half Kelly, their most under-rated player, who was preferred to Cope.

The experiment of playing wing-half Morton on the right wing was not a success. But, on the left, Fleming impressed Scotland team manager Ian

McColl, checking on Liverpool's Yeats and St. John, and may have played himself into an Under-23 place.

Yeats, big, strong, and not half as clumsy as he looks, is a fine centre half, but won only half the honours against Luton's Ashworth—the nearest thing to perpetual motion I have seen on a football field. St. John was well held by Kelly.

A bigger disappointment was Hunt who plays for England on Wednesday.

Liverpool are too good to be worried by this set-back. They will shrug it off and continue their march to Division I. Pacey's clever header in the

14th minute scored the only goal.
