

Lesser men, big triumph

TWO men, neither great names nor of high valuation, have placed Sun-derland back on the thres-hold of Division One.

And such is football's irony that this pair did it in fractions of seconds out of all the weary 3,780 minutes of the season's promotion ordeal.

First it was Martin Harvey, deputy for England's Stan Anderson. From Hooper's 71st-minute free-kick he shot with inspired aim and control through massed defenders into astounded Standen's goal.

Then, only five minutes later, it was Jimmy Montgomery's moment of triumph as he saved the extra point so spectacularly

won.

The young goalkeeper, who has doubled in stature since his first uneasy game in Wakeham's place six weeks ago, met and parried Turner's penalty kick with the undespairing certainty of a veteran.
