Smallest Crowd See Town

Defeated

A NXIETY about the Town's future increased a great deal at Kenilworth-road last night when, before the smallest crowd yet this season. 6,760, they slumped to defeat at the hands of Preston.

In yielding these two points they had only themselves to blame because they missed at least four chances of the gilt-edged variety before Preston took a snap lead early in the second half.

Even after that the opportunity

to hit back was there and it was only too patently obvious that something has got to be done. and speedily, about this front line. In marked contrast to Satur-

day, chances were created, but the finish in front of goal was not there, and it is difficult to see how it can be obtained short of new signings. In this respect the inside-

forward trio was a disappointment. Turner gave no real sign that he is back to his old goal power. Goldie is being beaten on the score of inexperience, and Lornie's capacity for hard work does not make up for his lack of basic skill. Nor were the wingers incisive

enough, though it seemed a tactical error not to give Walden more of the ball against the jittery Ross. Defensively the Town looked able enough until they were

caught soon after half-time by a quick pass, and Preston, relied on breaks-away for most of their second-half raids, finally settled matters 19 minutes from he end. To say that this was a sharp disappointment is pure under-

In the next minute he was in a good deal more trouble from a drive by Wylie which he managed to finger-tip over the bar only at the last split second. Best chance came after half-an-

hour and fell to Goldie following a poor clearance by Ross. Maybe Goldie was a little put off by the fact that Turner almost collided with him, but the fact remains that he had time to steady himself, instead of which he hit the ball first time and it went too high. Another opportunity cropped

up when brilliant work by Morton sent Walden away, who took the ball to the goal-line before slamming it across. Turner threw himself at it, but failed to make contact with his head and the ball was scrambled

away. At the same time the fact that two chances had been created was more encouraging, and the Town began to play with

increased confidence. Ross, who was showing signs of panic under pressure, came within inches of putting through his own goal with a badly sliced

clearance that rolled tantalisingly inches wide of the post. At this stage the Preston defence looked in real trouble and Allan Kelly just grabbed the ball off the head of Lornie when a

touch would have meant a goal.
