Lowly-Placed Luton snatched the valuable point they got from this game the hard way and thoroughly deserved it (writes VICTOR

By sheer fullblooded football that had Norwich ill at ease they crossed over with a two-goal lead and afterwards displayed so much spirit in defence that they looked anything but bottom-of-table candidates, especially under pressure.

For Luton's leader Ron Davies. this was a triumphant away draw.

He crowned his defence splitting work by a goal in each half and Harry Walden showed so many tricks, linked with his speed on the right wing, that he contributed to many harassing moments for the Canaries' not-so-steady defence.

Certainly Walden must have given young Colin Worrell, a local boy at full back for Norwich, his most anxious afternoon in a short pro-

fessional career.

As a result Norwich were never sure about their territorial advantage. It meant little when Davies

romped past skipper Ron Ashman and down the middle to score.

Or when, in another quick raid, Freddie Jardine caught Sandy Kennon napping with a shot he could not hold. That put the Canaries two down in the last minute of the first half. It was also a two-goal game for

Terry Allcock, leader of the Norwich line.

In the same minute that Allcock got his second goal—the 76th—left-half Ollie Burton celebrated his selection for the Welsh Under-23 side with a goal which Ron Baynham may still be baffled about.

From 35 yards or more Burton hit one of those terrific low drives for which he is now famed.

Baynham, who had earlier shown great form in stopping half a dozen really difficult shots, did not stir a foot. It was probably a rocket he could not have reached in any case
